Application for a major variation of Premises Licence under the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005

Fort William Football Club, Claggan Park, Claggan, Fort William

Report by the Clerk to the Licensing Board

Summary

This Report relates to an application for a major variation of Premises Licence in respect of Fort William Football Club, Claggan Park, Claggan, Fort William.

1.0 Description of Premises

The Fort William Football Club is a detached timber clad building adjacent to the grounds of Fort William Football Club and is situated within the village of Claggan.

The building comprises of a bar, hospitality suite, kitchen and toilet facilities.

1.1 Current Core Operating Hours

The premises currently enjoy the following operating hours:

On-Sale:

Saturday: 1300 hours to 1930 hours

2.0 Summary of Variation Application

2.1 Variation Sought

The applicant seeks to vary the premises licence as follows:-

- (i) Removal of seasonal variation which required the Clubhouse to close during the month of June and part of July;
- (ii) Increase core on-sale operating hours as follows:

Monday to Thursday:	1800 hours to 2400 hours
Friday and Saturday:	1100 hours to 0100 hours
Sunday:	1200 hours to 2400 hours

(iii) Additional activities within Operating Plan to include:

- Receptions
- Music
- Live Performances
- Dance Facilities
- Gaming
- Indoor/Outdoor Sports

(iv) Revision of Children's Policy to reflect increase in core licensed hours.

3.0 Background

3.1 On 24 June 2013 the Licensing Board received an application for a major variation of a Premises Licence from Fort William Football Club.

3.2 The application was publicised during the period 1 July until 22 July 2013 and confirmation that the site notice was displayed has been received.

3.3 In accordance with standard procedure, Police Scotland, Highlands & Islands Fire & Rescue Service, the Council's TEC Services (Environmental Health), Planning, Building Standards were consulted on the application.

Notification of the application was also sent to NHS Highland and the local Community Council.

3.4 No objections have been received in respect of the application.

TEC Services (Environmental Health) have lodged representations with regard to food handling and preparation. Given that the premises do not have Restaurant Facilities detailed within their Operating Plan, a copy of the representation has not been included with this report. A copy of the representation has however been sent to the applicant who has been requested to liaise directly with Environmental Health in this regard.

4.0 Legislation

4.1 The Licensing Board must in considering and determining the application, consider whether any grounds of refusal apply and if none of them applies, the Board must grant the application.

Relevant grounds of refusal may be: -

1. the grant of the application will be inconsistent with one or more of the licensing objectives;
2. having regard to; (i) the nature of the activities carried on or proposed to be carried on in the subject premises, (ii) the location character and condition of the premises, and (iii) the persons likely to frequent the premises, if the Board considers the premises are unsuitable for use for the sale of alcohol in accordance with the proposed variation;

3. having regard to the number and capacity of (i) licensed premises of the same or similar description as the subject premises (taking account of the proposed variation), in the locality in which the subject premises are situated, the Board considers that, if the application were to be granted, there would, as a result, be over provision of licensed premises or licensed premises of that description in the locality.

4.2 The Board has only power to either grant the application and make a variation of the conditions to which the licence is subject or, refuse the application.

If the Board refuses the application, the Board must specify the ground for refusal and if the ground for refusal is in relation to a licensing objective, the Board must specify the objective in question.

5.0 Licensing Standards Officer

The LSO has provided the following comments:-

- The increase in core hours applied for is within the policy hours of the Highland Licensing Board;
- the Children's Policy is in line with Board Policy;
- the premises are considered suitable for use for the sale of alcohol in accordance with the proposed variation;
- there would not appear to be any matter contained within the application that is inconsistent with the licensing objectives.

7.0 Conditions

7.1 Mandatory Conditions

It is not considered necessary to attach any additional Local Conditions.

If the Board are minded to refuse the application, the Board must specify the ground for refusal and if the ground for refusal is in relation to a licensing objective, the Board must specify the objective in question.
