Application for a major variation of Premises Licence under the Licensing (Scotland) Act 2005

Maryburgh Inn, 36 High Street, Fort William, PH33 6AT

Report by the Clerk to the Licensing Board

Summary

This Report relates to an application for a major variation of Premises Licence in respect of the Maryburgh Inn, 36 High Street, Fort William.

1.0 Description of Premises

The Maryburgh Inn is situated within the basement of a five storey building located on the High Street in the town centre area of Fort William. There are offices and residential flats located above the premises. The Premises consists of a public bar with a games area to the rear of the premises, toilet facilities, cellar and storage facilities.

1.1 Current Core Operating Hours

The premises currently enjoy the following operating hours:

On-Sale:

Monday to Saturday: 1100 hours to 0100 hours
Sunday: 1200 hours to 2400 hours

Off-Sale:

Monday to Saturday: 1100 hours to 2200 hours
Sunday: 1200 hours to 2200 hours

2.0 Summary of Variation Application

2.1 Variation Sought

The applicant seeks to vary the premises licence as follows:-

- (i) Increase the commencement hour for on and off sales on a Sunday from 1100 hours (currently 1200 hours).
- (ii) Increase the terminal hour for on-sales on a Sunday to 0100 hours (currently 2400 hours).

3.0 Background

3.1 On 30 October 2013 the Licensing Board received an application for a Major Variation of a Premises Licence from Greene King Retailing Ltd.

3.2 The application was publicised during the period 11 November 2013 until 2 December 2013 and confirmation that the site notice was displayed has been received.

3.3 In accordance with standard procedure, Police Scotland, Highlands & Islands Fire & Rescue Service, the Council's TEC Services (Environmental Health), Planning, Building Standards were consulted on the application.

Notification of the application was also sent to NHS Highland and the local Community Council.

3.4 No objections or representations have been received in respect of the application.

4.0 Legislation

4.1 The Licensing Board must in considering and determining the application, consider whether any grounds of refusal apply and if none of them applies, the Board must grant the application.

Relevant grounds of refusal may be: -

1. the grant of the application will be inconsistent with one or more of the licensing objectives;
2. having regard to; (i) the nature of the activities carried on or proposed to be carried on in the subject premises, (ii) the location character and condition of the premises, and (iii) the persons likely to frequent the premises, if the Board considers the premises are unsuitable for use for the sale of alcohol in accordance with the proposed variation;
3. having regard to the number and capacity of (i) licensed premises of the same or similar description as the subject premises (taking account of the proposed variation), in the locality in which the subject premises are situated, the Board considers that, if the application were to be granted, there would, as a result, be over provision of licensed premises or licensed premises of that description in the locality.

4.2 The Board has only power to either grant the application and make a variation of the conditions to which the licence is subject or, refuse the application.

If the Board refuses the application, the Board must specify the ground for refusal and if the ground for refusal is in relation to a licensing objective, the Board must specify the objective in question.

5.0 Licensing Standards Officer

The LSO has provided the following comments:-

- the additional increase in core hours sought on a Sunday is within the Board's policy;
- the premises are considered suitable for use for the sale of alcohol in accordance with the proposed variation;
- There would not appear to be any matter contained within the application that is inconsistent with the Licensing Objectives and the premises are considered suitable for use for the sale of alcohol in accordance with the proposed application.

6.0 HLB Local Policies

7.0 Conditions

7.1 Mandatory Conditions

If the application is approved the Mandatory Conditions set out in Schedule 3 of the Act will apply.

7.2 HLB Local Conditions

It is not considered necessary to attach any additional Local Conditions.

7.3 Mandatory Condition – Late Opening Premises

When the premises are operating as Late Opening Premises ie. the Festive Policy, then the following mandatory condition will apply:

1. A person trained to the satisfaction of the Licensing Board in administering First Aid must be present on the premises from 0100 hours (on any day when the premises are open at 0100 hours) until whichever is the earlier of:-
 - (a) the time at which the premises next close; and
 - (b) 0500 hours

7.4 HLB Special Condition

When the premises are operating as Late Opening Premises ie. the Festive Policy, then the following condition will apply:-

1. A designated person who is the holder of a personal licence must be present on the premises from 0100 hours.

Recommendation

The Board is invited to determine the above application and give consideration to granting the application as outlined at para. 2.1 and in addition to the Mandatory Conditions, consideration be given to attaching the proposed Mandatory Late Opening Premises Condition referred to at 7.3 of the report and the Special Local Condition, referred to at para. 7.4 of the report;

or

If the Board are minded to refuse the application, the Board must specify the ground for refusal and if the ground for refusal is in relation to a licensing objective, the Board must specify the objective in question.
