Communities Panel Development

Report by Head of Policy and Reform

Summary

The report summarises the approach to developing the Council's new Communities Panel. Members are asked to note the report and suggest any other groups that should be invited to be part of the Communities Panel.

1. Background

- 1.1 It was agreed at the Council meeting on 8 May 2014, that a Communities Panel would be created. This panel would exist alongside the Citizens' Panel and be available for responding to survey based consultations.
- 1.2 The intention is that the Communities Panel be comprised of community groups across the Highlands. The approach for creating the Panel is outlined below.

2. Communities Panel Approach

- 2.1 The Communities Panel will be comprised of organisations across Highland. The following criteria are to be used when creating the Panel to ensure that the groups on the Panel represent a range of community interests across Highland communities:
 - All organisations must be community based, located within Highland and be constituted groups.
 - The majority of members of the group should consist of members of that community (that could be community of interest or geography).
 - Membership of the group should be open to any member of that community.
 - Any surplus funds or assets of the group are to be applied for the benefit of that community.
- 2.2 The groups invited to participate in the Panel will be asked to nominate a contact who will receive and respond to surveys on the group's behalf. Groups will be asked to consider how best to engage their membership when compiling any response.
- 2.3 There are a range of core organisations with which the Council currently engages and the intention is to write and invite each of these groups to be part of the Communities Panel. These are:
 - Community Councils
 - Parent Councils
 - Tenant Participation groups

- Representative equalities groups

In addition to the above, services have been contacted and requested to provide any additional nominations.

- 2.4 A further step has been to contact the Highland Third Sector Interface. They hold a database of community based organisational contacts and while they are unable to give us these contact details they will assist in distributing the invitation list to their contacts on our behalf.
- 2.5 Community Planning Partners have also been contacted for advice on groups to include. They will also be able to utilise the Communities Panel for consultation and engagement in the future.

3. Next Steps

- 3.1 An initial draft list of groups to invite to be part of the Panel within the Inverness area is outlined at appendix 1. This includes groups specifically local to this area but also Highland wide groups that cover Inverness wards. Members are asked to consider the list and provide details of any additional organisations you feel should be invited to participate in the panel. There will also be an opportunity to discuss this at Ward Business Meetings. The Panel is expected to grow over time as more groups participate and new community groups form.
- 3.2 The first focus for the Communities Panel will be responding to the second phase of the Council's Budget Consultation. This will consist of a survey based approach developed largely from the consultation responses to stage one and will have a focus on specific proposals. This second consultation phase will begin towards the end of September until November to enable firm budget proposals to be considered by Members from December 2014 onwards.
- 3.3 Although the Communities Panel will be used in the first instance for consultation on the budget setting process, the Panel will provide a useful tool for ongoing consultation and engagement with communities across Highland both on a pan-Highland but also local level for area-based consultations. It would also be available for CPP partner use and will be constructed with that in mind, i.e. data sharing/protection clarity.

4. Implications

- 4.1 Resource – The Panel will be managed from within existing resources.
- 4.2 Legal – Appropriate consents in relation to data sharing will be obtained when constructing the panel.
- 4.3 Equalities – Organisations representing equalities groups will be invited to participate in the Panel and this will contribute to the Duty on the Council to advance equality (Equality Act 2010).
- 4.4 Rural – Groups will be invited from across the Highland area to ensure representation from remote and rural communities.
- 4.5 Climate Change/Carbon Clever – Environmental groups are amongst those to

be invited to participate in the Panel.

- 4.6 Risk – Care will be taken to ensure that the Panel is representative of the Highland community.

- Consider, and suggest additional representative groups to be included in the draft invitation list provided at Appendix 1.
