DEPRIVED AREA FUND 2015-16

Report by Director of Development and Infrastructure

Summary

The report invites Members to consider recommendations for the allocation of the Deprived Area Fund for 2015-16 in the Nairn, Badenoch and Strathspey Area.

The Deprived Area Fund directly supports the Council's programme by assisting organisations working in defined disadvantaged communities to develop and implement activities aimed at improving quality of life and regenerating communities. Priority will be given to projects which directly deliver employability outcomes for individuals who live within the targeted area and who are furthest removed from the labour market.

1. Background

1.1 The scope and criteria of the Deprived Area Fund 2014-15 (DAF) was approved by PED Committee on 14 August 2013. A note of the criteria and areas of benefit are attached at **Appendix 1**.

2 2015 - 2016 AWARDS

2.1 Notice of the 2015 – 16 Funds was placed in press and public notices, on the Council's website and an e-mail sent to all Council Members in November 2014. A total of 2 applications were received by the closing date of 9 January 2015 for the Nairn, Badenoch and Strathspey Area Funding – as shown in the table below. The allocated Budget is £20,000.

- 2.2 These applications have been given an appraisal including:
 - an examination of the applicant's proposals by Council officers to assess the need and appropriateness of the proposals, their "fit" with partner services to avoid duplication, and the capacity of the organisation to deliver using the assessment criteria outlined in **Appendix 1**;
 - a separate technical assessment of the organisation is carried out, including its governance, experience, other activities undertaken, and how business is managed, including an examination of its Annual Report and Accounts. This undertaken by a Council Officer with assistance from other Services where appropriate;
 - organisations already in receipt of DAF have had to submit quarterly reports of the organisation's performance in meeting the targets set for 2012-13; and
 - where necessary further information has been obtained, project meetings and visits undertaken as necessary – and in some cases Council staff are in weekly contact with the organisations undertaking joint activities.
- 2.3 Details of the applications and assessments are attached at Appendix 2 to this Report. Members will note that the application from Nairn River Community Council is recommended for deferral at this time for the reasons stated. Some aspects of these proposals will be investigated further, and it is recommended that delegated powers be given to the Director of Development & Infrastructure, in consultation with the Chair of the Area Committee and Ward Members, over the use of the balance of the Fund in 2015-16.

3 IMPLICATIONS

3.1 Resource

The recommendations, if accepted by members, are within the budget and will leave £10,682 available for allocation in the course of the year.

3.2 Risk

The recommendations are based on a thorough assessment of the organisations' capacity to deliver efficiently and effectively. The organisations are established and meet current monitoring requirements.

3.3 Equalities

The Deprived Area Fund aims to tackle identified socio-economic inequalities. In particular the measures within the programme particularly target young people, women and people with long term conditions.

3.4 Climate Change

There are no significant Climate Change implications arising from the Report.

3.5 Legal

There are no Legal implications arising from the Report

3.6 Rural Impact

The revised geographic targeting of the Deprived Area Fund has identified a wider range of communities as eligible including rural areas.

EMPLOYMENT SERVICES GRANT FUNDING Closing Date 9th January 2015

Purpose:

Applications are invited from community and third sector organisations to assist in the key outcome of widening participation in the labour market in targeted Highland communities. Allied to this and a secondary outcome sought, is to increase the skills and confidence of these targeted communities to take action themselves to widen participation in the labour market.

Funding will be available to March 2017 and applications for projects over that period will be considered as well as shorter term proposals.

Key Criterion for Applications to the Deprived Area Fund

Criterion 1: Effective targeting - proposals must respond to identified community needs (primarily within the identified datazones) including published statistics and evidenced community and client group engagement and consultation.

Criterion 2: Identified employability aims – proposals must have identified and evidenced employability outputs and outcomes.

Criterion 3: Proposals must complement and add value to other related services and programmes tackling poverty and inequality.

Criterion 4: Proposals must engage with local communities and build community capacity and leadership.

Application and Assessment Process

Deprived Area funding applications must be received by the closing date of **Friday 9th January 2015.** Appraisals of the proposals will be undertaken by officers of the Council in liaison with partner organisations with recommendations with funding decisions being made at appropriate Area Committees.

Project Summary:

Funding applied for is for half of a Co-ordinator's salary, for a Social Enterprise to be set up by the NRE project by April 2015. Further funding for the remainder of the Co-ordinator's salary will be sought through applicable grant applications and match funding.

The Co-ordinator will run the first projects proposed for the Social Enterprise, of grounds' maintenance work and riverside regeneration, and also develop further projects that will benefit the local community.

The local community will benefit with the establishment of a Social Enterprise.

Community leadership and capacity, engagement and capacity will all be encouraged; along with tackling social inclusion, poverty and inequality. The Social Enterprise will work with related services and partnerships, in particular, Employability, to help people back into employment, and identify community needs and projects of benefit to the community.

The grounds' maintenance project will help the local community by assisting more local people into sustained employment; providing work experience and offering training and practical skills (in the maintenance of equipment and learning about horticulture); and qualifications (gaining certificates in the management of invasive weeds and Health & Safety).

The riverside regeneration enhancements will benefit the local community by providing jobs, training, and work experience to improve employability.

Measurable Outcomes:

- 17 individuals helped:; 1 person into sustained employment; 6 people trained 5 gaining qualifications; 5 gaining work experience
- 2 public bodies / community groups worked with For Community engagement 10 people participating directly in Social Enterprise & working with people in the community in Developing community leadership & capacity
- 3 surveys to Identify community needs.
- 2% increase in local relevant statistics for Social inclusion
- 2% decrease in local relevant statistics for Tackling poverty and inequality
- 2 organisations Work with related services and partnerships
- Combine results from all of the above to determine Community development 5% increase in Employability targets (using strategic skills pipeline criteria) 10% increase in people walking in area / attending organised walks for Social health & wellbeing

Project Summary:

The project is seeking funding to continue to provide a part time, experienced generalist adviser/volunteer support worker (VSW) who will support the provision of holistic advice and information at each Work Club session/Food bank session in Nairn and make referrals into the bureau's specialist advisers when necessary. This person will also help the bureau to identify suitable candidates for volunteering with us from within the most deprived areas of Nairn -targeting particularly under 25 yr olds, long term unemployed, underemployed, those with medical conditions, lone parents and those moving onto JSA from Income Support/Employment and Support Allowance (including those who attend the Work Club/Foodbank), as well as those who have been sanctioned. The VSW will provide training, support and assistance to them to complete their training and competence assessments successfully and to begin volunteering with the bureau -eventually supporting the work brought to the bureau from these outreaches.

The funding requested covers worker salary, national insurance, pension, recruitment, training, travel and subsistence and also project running and management and admin costs

Our office on the High Street is already working at capacity and whilst we are seeking to expand our premises, being able to have an advice session at the Community Centre and/or Food bank will also mean that more people can be seen more quickly.

Measurable Outcomes:

A minimum of 10 people will benefit from being offered training and volunteering opportunities

200 people will benefit from the bureau's increased capacity to deliver advice services in the longer term.
