Performance against the Highland Local Policing Plan 2017-20

Report by the Highland Local Policing Commander – Chief Superintendent George Macdonald

Summary

To provide an update to Committee Members on the progress with reference to the objectives outlined in the Highland 2017-20 Policing Plan.

1. Performance

- 1.1 Crime in the Highland area has decreased slightly in comparison to 2016/17; Recorded Class 1-4 Crimes have decreased from 5632 (2016/17) compared to 5528 (2017/18) - a decrease of 1.8%.

The Performance in Highland remained strong with an overall detection rate of 66.4% (Class 1-5 Crimes) for 2017/18.

Class 1- Crimes of Violence: 10% reduction from 2016/17 (246 compared to 221).

Class 2- Sexual Crimes: 28% reduction from 2016/17 (619 compared to 445).

Class 3- Crimes of Dishonesty: 5.9% increase from 2016/17 (2946 compared to 3131).

Class 4- Fire-raising, Malicious Mischief: 4.9% reduction from the previous year (1821 compared to 1731).

Class 5- Other Crimes: 6.9% increase from 2016/17 (2176 compared to 2339).

- 1.2 A summary of the current performance against the 2017-20 Highland Local Policing Plan objectives is at **Appendix 1**. The period covered by the report is as at 31 March 2018 unless stated otherwise.

PRIORITY – Road Safety and Road Crime

Objective – With Partners, deliver a Road Safety Strategy which focuses on: Challenging Driver Behaviour; Education at the road side and elsewhere; Detection of offences linked to contributing factors of Fatal and Serious Road Collisions; and collectively reducing potential harm.

<p>Prevention and Intervention Activity including Driving Ambition</p>	<p>Road Safety and Road Crime remains a local priority in the Highland area. Whilst the overall number of people killed and seriously injured on Highland roads has reduced over the past 3 years, when fatal or serious collisions do occur they have a significant impact on families and communities. We will continue to target and enforce inappropriate driving and behaviour whilst working alongside our partners and participating in initiatives to educate and promote positive outcomes.</p> <p><u>Driving Ambition</u> delivered to 15 secondary schools in the Highlands (Wick, Thurso, Dornoch, Golspie, Tain, Ullapool, Millburn, I.R.A, Culloden Academy, Lochaber, Kinlochleven, Mallaig, Nairn, Kingussie and Portree). Further sessions scheduled for this reporting year.</p> <p><u>Safe Highlanders</u> is a multi-agency event promoting community safety including road safety, health and crime prevention to pupils. After the event children become more aware of personal safety. Potentially, they avoid becoming victims of crime and understand how to react to emergency situations and their chances of becoming a good citizen increases. Sessions took place across throughout the Highlands including Inverness, Fort William, Lairg, Portree, and Caithness during 2017.</p>												
<p>Road Traffic Operations/Campaigns</p>	<p>The annual <u>Motorcycle Safety Campaign 2017</u> - ran between Friday 24 March 2017 and Sunday 1 October 2017. Road Policing officers delivered a 6 month period of focused activity around motorcycle safety, including engagement, education and enforcement. Rider behaviour and speeding are significant contributory factors in collisions involving motorcycles. The robust enforcement of these offences will be delivered via speed checks and high visibility patrols on key routes including NC500.</p> <p><u>Rider Refinement North</u> - A new training scheme to help reduce the number of collisions involving motorcyclists has been launched by road safety partners in the north of Scotland and Highlands. PRIORITY – Violence, Disorder and Anti-social Behaviour including Alcohol and Drugs Misuse

Intention – With partners, better understand the causes to prevent and reduce instances of Anti-social Behaviour, Violence and Disorder to enhance community safety across the Highland Area

Objective – Work with partners to share information, support Education, Prevention, Diversionary and Enforcement Measures linked to harmful alcohol consumption; maintain robust procedures around licensed premises; support victims of violent crime by working with partners to improve service provision and prevent repeat victimisation.

Prevention and Intervention Activity	<p>Alcohol continues to be a significant factor in violent crime in the Highland area. We will continue to maintain robust licensing procedures and focus on licensed premises inspections and also work with partners to reduce the harm caused by private space violence. Domestic Abuse incidents remain at a significant level across the area, with an upward trend in reporting over the last 6 years. This will remain a priority for the Division. We will continue to work with partners to give victims improved outcomes and confidence to report.</p> <p>Police Scotland N Division remains committed to reducing Violence, Disorder and Antisocial Behaviour. We maintain a collaborative approach with Partners in order to reduce the harm it causes in our communities.</p>					

N Division Police, Prison and Fire service came together to create an educational input to accompany participation in **Rock Challenge 2018**. This was delivered to all schools based in the Highland area. This was a significant commitment by the Services and aimed to educate young people on the legal consequences of drug/alcohol misuse, this accompanies and compliments Rock Challenge which is a Diversionary scheme and the focus is on healthy lifestyle choices and the consequences of involvement with drugs/alcohol.

Four Highland secondary schools - Thurso, Invergordon, Alness and Dingwall - participating in Rock Challenge took part in the national final in Dundee on 15/06/218. Kinross High School won Rock Challenge, and each of the Highland schools were placed 2nd, 3rd, 4th and 5th – a great achievement.

Festive Roadshow – a series of roadshows throughout shopping hubs throughout the North, South and Inverness Area Commands. Events organised by Preventions and Interventions Unit supported by SFRS, Womens Aid, Highland Council and Royal Bank of Scotland. Preventative advice on a wide range of criminality was given to members of the public who were encouraged to keep safe over the festive season. Fire Home Safety visits arranged.

Persistent Offender Project - has been running in the Inverness area and the joint agency project (police, criminal justice social work, NHS and SPS) provides an opportunity for individuals aged 16+ who have persistently offended within the Inverness area through their substance misuse, to be assessed and offered support to minimise their substance misuse and stop offending. There are currently 20 individuals working with the project. Participation is entirely voluntary.

Inverness City centre police team (CCPT) comprising of a Sergeant and 8 Constables has seen an immediate and noticeable reduction in street disorder and a surge in public confidence in Police Scotland. The implementation of the Inverness City Centre Policing team has cemented partnership working with security staff and the Business Improvement District (BID) task force who support retailers, security staff and police. Shopsafe radio is used by all city centre officers to link them to most retail outlets and licensed premises.

An enhanced version of the National Stop & Search Database commenced on 1 June 2015. The enhanced database brought significant changes in the process of data capture and the methodology for recording data items. No previous year to date figures are provided as it has been previously acknowledged this data is not 100% accurate, therefore comparisons will provide misleading results or invalid conclusions. Positive Stop Search – A positive stop and search is when an item is recovered where possession of same implies criminality on the part of the individual being searched or any other; or potentially compromises the safety of that individual or another.

A **Seizure** occurs when – alcohol, and/or; tobacco product, and/or; cigarette papers are surrendered, or are removed from an individual by a Police Officer, for the purpose of safeguarding the health and well-being of that individual or any other, in circumstances where the stop and search tactic has NOT been utilised and no physical search of an individual has taken place.

PRIORITY – Acquisitive Crime

Intention – With Partners and Communities, prevent instances of acquisitive crime across the Highland area

Objective – With Partners, share information, support education, prevention, diversionary and enforcement activity linked to acquisitive crime; develop work with targets – recidivist offenders to reduce reoffending linked to acquisitive crime e.g. Persistent Offenders programme; enhance the use of all media platforms to raise awareness of local and national preventative initiatives.

communities in respect of their feelings of safety. Two week period of action carried out across the N Division with roadshows taking place throughout the Highlands. These involved Prevention and Intervention unit officers, Crimestoppers and Trading Standards. In addition visits were carried out to all quarries, builders' merchants, banks, financial institutes and caravan sites to brief them on door step crime issues. Scam/bogus caller talk delivered to friendship clubs, lunch clubs and to members of Mens Shed throughout Highland.

The Banking Protocol is an initiative between the police, banking institutions & Trading Standards. Its aim is at the earliest opportunity to identify vulnerable victims who are in the process of being defrauded of funds from their bank accounts by unscrupulous criminals and to intervene to prevent these crimes.

Victims, particularly elderly and other vulnerable people are targeted by suspects for a range of fraud offences, including courier fraud and bogus worker offences. These crimes often involve the perpetrator encouraging the victim to attend their bank, post office or other financial services provider in person and withdraw or transfer cash.

The Protocol is designed to provide a standardised method for how these concerns are dealt with and reported to police and to stop multiple victimisation. This protocol commenced nationally and in the Highland region during March 2017.

Construction Watch - The Highland area continued to see a decrease in the number of thefts of tools and construction equipment. As the below table shows three less incidents were recorded over the same period and continues to show a 50% decrease in incidents recorded prior to the launch of Construction within the Inverness area. Discussions ongoing regarding the roll out of this initiative throughout the Highlands.

Objective – With Partners and as corporate parents we will deliver the C.H.A.M.P.S (Highland Champion Board) strategy; with Partners we will focus on safeguarding communities; with Partners we will address emerging issues through Prevention and Intervention

N Division has seen a 13.4% increase in missing persons over the last reporting year. These investigations related to 670 people, 130 of whom went missing more than once. 591 (52%) investigations related to someone who had been missing more than once and 224 (20%) investigations related to someone who had been missing 10 or more times.

Note: the Police Scotland National Missing Persons Database definition of a child changed from <16 in 2016/17 to <18 in 2017/18 to reflect the changes introduced by the Criminal Justice (Scotland) Act 2016.

Prevention and Intervention Activity

Vulnerability is one of the most significant demands on Police resources not only in Highland but across Scotland. We will work over the next 3 years to ensure that best practice is used to develop strategies and initiatives to prevent harm, investigate and target those who abuse, exploit and pose the greatest risk of harm in our communities.

NHS Huddle- Undoubtedly, we face real challenges when dealing with incidents relating to vulnerable persons. The Mental lead in the Division speaks to NHS and Highland Council Mental Health colleagues daily to review any concerns about local processes and we have a more formal meeting once a month. Covered is a wide range of topics including, mental health detentions, use of police custody and transport of patients amongst other things.

Community Mental Health Triage- This pilot has been running over weekends in Inverness since 26th January 2018. The aim of the pilot is to demonstrate that Community Triage leads to more timely intervention by Mental Health professionals when required, avoiding unnecessary detention either in a police station or hospital. From Tuesday 5th June this service was extended and is now available between 1700 hours and 0800 hours Monday to Thursday as well as 1700 hours on Friday and 0800 hours on Monday every week.

Officers are encouraged to use the service in the first instance to help provide the most appropriate response to someone in mental health crisis / distress.

Distress Brief Intervention- The DBI pilot has been running in the Inverness area since the end of October 2018. Distress Brief Interventions are an innovative way of supporting people in Distress. The programme is a 53 month initiative which emerged from the Scottish Government's work on the Suicide Prevention and Mental Health

Strategies which showed that people in distress require improved co-ordination across agencies, quicker access to support and more consistency in the compassion they receive. We are fortunate to be one of 4 pilot sites in Scotland and are working closely with Support in Mind Scotland and other partner agencies.

Keep Safe was launched in Inverness and wider Highland area. This initiative works by providing Keep Safe places across shopping hubs offering support and assistance to anyone feeling lost, vulnerable, frightened or who has become a victim of crime. This includes elderly, disabled and vulnerable people.

PRIORITY – Serious & Organised Crime

Intention – With Partners, reduce the threat, risk and harm caused by Serious Organised Crime

Objective – With Partners work to safeguard the Highland area by taking all opportunities to prevent crime and make the Highland area a hostile environment for Serious & Organised Crime Groups; to improve outcomes for individuals and communities and reduce offending through prevention, early intervention and diversion; in support of our Partners in the Local Authority and NHS via the Highland Alcohol and Drug Partnership Strategy we will direct those who are substance dependant towards recovery through prevention, treatment and support services; with Partners work to reduce the instances of substance misuse in our communities

<p>Serious & Organised Crime</p>	<p>Alcohol and Drug Misuse is a cross cutting issue in the Highland area and has a clear link with the mental wellbeing of individuals living in our communities. The effects of substance misuse is evident, to varying degrees, across the Highland area. Throughout the duration of this plan we are committed to working with communities to reduce harm caused by Drugs and Alcohol. Substance misuse will continue to be a persistent and challenging issue for communities and we recognise the need to remain agile and responsive to new trends and sources.</p> <p>Divisional arrests – 26 arrests in relation to Divisional Mapped Serious Organised Crime Groups during 2017/18</p> <p>Drugs Offences – 134 nominals have been charged in relation to 174 supply offences, 1108 nominals have been charged in relation to 1568 possession offences</p> <p>Proceeds of Crime £2,671,465.88 = Cash £35,763.25 plus Assets £2,635,702.63</p>
<p>Prevention and Intervention Activity</p>	<p>Divisional Operation - multi-agency approach to suspected underlying criminality (money laundering, human trafficking, immigration, drugs, etc.) within the takeaway and restaurant industry. Partners include Environmental Health, Licensing Standards, Trading Standards, Internal Audit and Fraud investigation from the Highland Council; HMRC; Home Office Immigration Enforcement and Scottish Fire and Rescue Service. There are an inordinate number of takeaways and restaurants throughout Highland and Islands, some of which are mapped to Organised Crime Groups.</p> <p>Divisional Operation – ongoing investigation into online/electronic frauds which have targeted Highland businesses/charities and have resulted in the loss of substantial amounts of money.</p> <p>In light of this a Cybercrime masterclass event was organised and live streamed across the Highland and Islands. Its main aim was to bring together businesses within the Highlands and Islands under one roof and to provide inputs from partner agencies highlighting current crime trends in the cyber world in an attempt to educate businesses. We secured the services of two Ethical Hackers from the Scottish Business Resilience Centre, who offered to do a one hour input on such topics as Updates, Ransomware, Social Engineering, Phishing, Malicious</p>

	<p>websites, Wi-Fi, USB sticks and the danger and encryption aimed at the business community.</p>
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Several ongoing operations in relation to the supply and production of controlled drugs.

PRIORITY – Counter Terrorism & Domestic Extremism

Intention – Support the delivery of the CONTEST strategy to reduce the threat posed by terrorism and domestic extremism

Objective – Strengthen PREVENT work with Partners and institutions; with Partners, support individuals who are vulnerable to terrorism and violent extremism; strengthen PREVENT work in relation to the internet and Social Media; Effective Multi-agency planning in respect of Counter Terrorism is taking place; Develop our ability to respond effectively to any terrorist attack (with a specific focus on emerging high-risk threats, and specialist capabilities).

Counter Terrorism & Domestic Extremism	The threat from Terrorism and Domestic Extremism is a national priority. The Highland area has strategic sites and a vast coast line with numerous small ports. It is important that we protect our communities from Terrorism and Domestic Extremism and ensure that we have watchful, knowledgeable and resilient communities who can prevent Terrorism occurring through education, enforcement and vigilance. We work closely with Highland Council and other partners to deliver the four strands of the CONTEST Strategy; Protect, Prevent, Prepare and Pursue, as laid down by the Counter Terrorism and Security Act 2015.
Prevention & Intervention Activity	<p>WRAP (Workshop to Raise Awareness of Prevent) is an interactive facilitated workshop aimed at frontline staff such as police, social services, probation, education and health staff. It seeks to support staff to recognise that using their existing expertise and professional judgement, they may be able to recognise potentially vulnerable individuals.</p> <p>The ACT NOW for schools project consists of four lessons exploring issues surrounding terrorism. Its purpose is to encourage diverse communities to understand counter-terrorism issues and to feel confident about making decisions based upon the information they are given.</p> <p>Work ongoing in Highland region to develop contacts in order to run WRAP and ACT NOW sessions for relevant groups. Sessions have taken place in South, North and Inverness area commands and delivered to schools, local authority, SFRS and Scottish Canals.</p>
