This was delivered to all schools based in the Highland area during March 2018. This was a significant commitment by the Services and aimed to educate young people on the legal consequences of drug/alcohol misuse, this accompanies and compliments Rock Challenge which is a Diversionary scheme and the focus is on healthy lifestyle choices and the consequences of involvement with drugs/alcohol. An enhanced version of the National Stop & Search Database commenced on 1 June 2015. The enhanced database brought significant changes in the process of data capture and the methodology for recording data items.

Positive Stop Search - A positive stop and search is when an item is recovered where possession of same implies criminality on the part of the individual being searched or any other; or potentially compromises the safety of that individual or another.

A **seizure** occurs when - alcohol, and/or; tobacco product, and/or; cigarette papers are surrendered, or are removed from an individual by a Police Officer, for the purpose of safeguarding the health and well-being of that individual or any other, in circumstances where the stop and search tactic has NOT been utilised and no physical search of an individual has taken place.

Prevention and Intervention Activity	<p>The Banking Protocol is an initiative between the police, banking institutions & Trading Standards. Its aim is at the earliest opportunity to identify vulnerable victims who are in the process of being defrauded of funds from their bank accounts by unscrupulous criminals and to intervene to prevent these crimes.</p> <p>Victims, particularly elderly and other vulnerable people are targeted by suspects for a range of fraud offences, including courier fraud and bogus worker offences. These crimes often involve the perpetrator encouraging the victim to attend their bank, post office or other financial services provider in person and withdraw or transfer cash.</p> <p>The Protocol is designed to provide a standardised method for how these concerns are dealt with and reported to police and to stop multiple victimisation. This protocol commenced nationally and in the Inverness region during March 2018.</p>

Note: the Police Scotland National Missing Persons Database definition of a child changed from <16 in 2016/17 to <18 in 2017/18 to reflect the changes introduced by the Criminal Justice (Scotland) Act 2016.

During this reporting period, there have been 687 missing person reports in the Inverness Command area. This figure does not include missing persons from other areas who are traced in the Inverness Command area. There has been a 14% increase in missing person investigations on the previous reporting year.

These incidents represent a very high risk area of police business and necessitate immediate response. Police Scotland employs a missing person co-ordinator who meets with the local authority on a weekly basis to review placements for looked after children. Where necessary this includes daily contact when incidents occur.

NHS Huddle- Undoubtedly, we face real challenges when dealing with incidents relating to vulnerable persons. The Mental Health lead in the Division speaks to NHS and Highland Council Mental Health colleagues daily to review any concerns about local processes and we have a more formal meeting once a month. Covered is a wide range of topics including, mental health detentions, use of police custody and transport of patients amongst other things.

Community Mental Health Triage- This pilot has been running over weekends in Inverness since 26th January 2018. The aim of the pilot is to demonstrate that Community Triage leads to more timely intervention by Mental Health professionals when required, avoiding unnecessary detention either in a police station or hospital. From Tuesday 5th June this service was extended and is now available between 1700 hours and 0800 hours Monday to Thursday as well as 1700 hours on Friday and 0800 hours on Monday every week.

Officers are encouraged to use the service in the first instance to help provide the most appropriate response to someone in mental health crisis / distress.

PRIORITY – Serious & Organised Crime

Intention – With Partners, reduce the threat, risk and harm caused by Serious Organised Crime

Objective – With Partners work to safeguard the Highland area by taking all opportunities to prevent crime and make the Highland area a hostile environment for Serious & Organised Crime Groups; to improve outcomes for individuals and communities and reduce offending through prevention, early intervention and diversion; in support of our Partners in the Local Authority and NHS via the Highland Alcohol and Drug Partnership Strategy we will direct those who are substance dependant towards recovery through prevention, treatment and support services; with Partners work to reduce the instances of substance misuse in our communities

Serious & Organised Crime	<p>Divisional Operation - intelligence development and investigation into drug supply and use in educational establishments throughout the Division, including Inverness Area Command. All intelligence will continue to be monitored daily and passed to the local area inspector for proactive approach.</p> <p>Divisional Operation – ongoing investigation into recent online/electronic frauds which have targeted local business/charities and have resulted in the loss of substantial amounts of money in the Division and in the Inverness Area over the current reporting year.</p>
Prevention and Intervention Activity	<p>During this reporting period over 50 Misuse of Drugs search warrants have been executed in the Inverness Command area resulting in significant cash and drug seizures and revealing further lines of enquiry currently being developed. Information and intelligence submitted by communities in the Inverness and Highland area is always well received and actioned appropriately by Police.</p> <p>Proactive drug seizures continue in the Inverness Command area and this reporting period has seen several significant drug and cash seizures.</p>

Objective – Strengthen PREVENT work with Partners and institutions; with Partners, support individuals who are vulnerable to terrorism and violent extremism; strengthen PREVENT work in relation to the internet and Social Media; Effective Multi-agency planning in respect of Counter Terrorism is taking place; Develop our ability to respond effectively to any terrorist attack (with a specific focus on emerging high-risk threats, and specialist capabilities).

Counter Terrorism & Domestic Extremism	<p>WRAP (Workshop to Raise Awareness of Prevent) The workshop covers issues such as crime, normal social processes that are used to influence and manipulate, case studies that cut across the spectrum of extremism, terrorist ideologies and factors which may contribute to an individual's susceptibility to a terrorist ideology.</p> <p>In particular, it seeks to support them to recognise that using their existing expertise and professional judgement, they may be able to recognise potentially vulnerable individuals who may be susceptible to being persuaded by an extremist or terrorist ideology. Sessions were delivered to UHI during January 2018.</p> <p>The ACT NOW for schools project consists of four lessons exploring issues surrounding terrorism, It centre around a fictitious table top exercise delivered by external community facilitators with support from the local police. The lessons also cover political and historical terrorism and human safety versus human rights. The purpose of ACT NOW for schools is to encourage diverse communities to understand counter-terrorism issues and to feel confident about making decisions based upon the information they are given.</p> <p>ACT Now Sessions were delivered to pupils at Millburn Academy and Inverness Royal Academy during March 2018. The purpose being to give young people a better understanding of violent extremism within communities.</p>

Prevention and Intervention Activity	<p>Keep Safe launched in Inverness during December 2017. This initiative works by providing Keep Safe places across shopping hubs offering support and assistance to anyone feeling lost, vulnerable, frightened or who has become a victim of crime. This includes elderly, disabled and vulnerable people. This initiative is now firmly embedded in the Eastgate Shopping Centre. It will be further developed and plans are in place to introduce this initiative to Inverness Pubwatch, Inverness BID and Highlife Highland in Inverness to roll out to libraries and leisure centres.</p> <p><u>Inverness City centre police team</u> (CCPT) comprising of a Sergeant and 8 Constables has seen an immediate and noticeable reduction in street disorder and a surge in public confidence in Police Scotland.</p> <p>The implementation of the Inverness City Centre Policing team has cemented partnership working with security staff and the Business Improvement District (BID) task force who support retailers, security staff and police. Shopsafe radio is used by all city centre officers to link them to most retail outlets and licensed premises. This initiative continues to great effect and has been welcomed by BID, Eastgate Security staff, retailers and shoppers alike.</p>

An enhanced version of the National Stop & Search Database commenced on 1 June 2015. The enhanced database brought significant changes in the process of data capture and the methodology for recording data items.

Positive Stop Search - A positive stop and search is when an item is recovered where possession of same implies criminality on the part of the individual being searched or any other; or potentially compromises the safety of that individual or another.

A **seizure** occurs when - alcohol, and/or; tobacco product, and/or; cigarette papers are surrendered, or are removed from an individual by a Police Officer, for the purpose of safeguarding the health and well-being of that individual or any other, in circumstances where the stop and search tactic has NOT been utilised and no physical search of an individual has taken place.

PRIORITY – Acquisitive Crime

Intention – With Partners and Communities, prevent instances of acquisitive crime across the Highland area

Objective – With Partners, share information, support education, prevention, diversionary and enforcement activity linked to acquisitive crime; develop work with targets - recidivist offenders - to reduce reoffending linked to acquisitive crime e.g. Persistent Offenders programme; enhance the use of all media platforms to raise awareness of local and national preventative initiatives.
