| Road Traffic Operations/Campaigns/Prevention and Intervention Activity. | <p>Operation Cedar - (Challenge, Educate, Detect and Reduce) builds on established practices and will continue to focus on various agencies working in partnership to reduce the number of people killed and seriously injured in the area. Operation CEDAR involves proactive multi-agency enforcement operations on the roads, which sits alongside education activity and is aimed at improving the behaviour of drivers of all ages behind the wheel. Partner agencies continue to work together to gain a greater understanding of the factors which could be used to improve the safety of everyone on the roads and together respond to these issues.</p> <p>Driver Engagement North - A multi-agency initiative makes use of an interactive driving simulator designed to assess and highlight a participant's reactions, hazard awareness and any potential vulnerabilities on the roads. The project, launched in Inverness during October 2019, received funding from Transport Scotland and is led by Police Scotland, with support from a number of partners including the NHS Highland, Local Authority Community Safety Groups, IAM Roadsmart, Age Concern and RoSPA. The simulator has been specially designed to assess and demonstrate a driver's reactions and abilities in a safe environment under the supervision of specialists who will be able to offer support and advice. While this initiative is aimed at older drivers, we will also be able to offer advice to family members or friends who are concerned about whether someone they know is fit to drive. This initiative is not currently running due to the COVID-19 pandemic.</p> <p>Any interested parties looking for more information can contact:- highlandandislandsdriverengagement@scotland.pnn.police.uk</p> <p>Festive Safety Campaign 2020 – The campaign ran between 01 December 2020 and 02 January 2021. Police Scotland is committed to achieving the Scottish Government's 2020 casualty reduction targets. Increasing awareness of the risks associated with drink/drug driving supports the Force's efforts to reduce road casualties. The campaign was conducted through a combination of intelligence-led high visibility patrols and static road checks.</p> <p>North Coast 500 (NC500) and Visitor Management - There are Road Policing plans in place for motorcyclists/vulnerable road users and Visitor Management for the year ahead and analytical work has been carried out to ensure Police Scotland are targeting the right areas and road users at the right time.</p> <p>Police Scotland are committed to reducing road casualties across the Highland area and patrols will be conducted on priority routes on a daily basis and undertaking specific weekends of action on the NC500 route utilising car and motorcycle patrols with the aim to influence driver and road user behaviour, detect and deter criminality on our roads and reassure communities. We will continue to promote our activity through media channels and encourage anyone with road safety concerns to contact Police Scotland.</p> | | | | | |

PRIORITY – Serious & Organised Crime

Intention – Reduce the harm caused by Serious & Organised Crime including cyber related crime.

Objective – With Partners work to safeguard the Highland area by taking all opportunities to prevent crime and make the Highland area a hostile environment for Serious & Organised Crime Groups; to improve outcomes for individuals and communities and reduce offending through prevention, early intervention and diversion; in support of our Partners in the Local Authority and NHS via the Highland Alcohol and Drug Partnership Strategy we will direct those who are substance dependant towards recovery through prevention, treatment and support services; with Partners work to reduce the instances of substance misuse in our communities.

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| <p>Serious & Organised Crime.</p> | <p>Divisional Operation - Intelligence development and investigation into drug supply and use in educational establishments throughout the Division, including Easter Ross. All intelligence will continue to be monitored daily and passed to the local Area Inspector for a proactive approach.</p> <p>Divisional Operation – Ongoing investigation into recent online/electronic frauds which have targeted local business/charities and have resulted in the loss of substantial amounts of money in the Division and in the Easter Ross area over the current reporting year.</p> |

| Prevention and Intervention Activity. | Police investigated 137 reports of missing persons in the North Highland Area Command during this reporting period. (Due to system configurations these figures are not available at multi-member ward level). North Highland Area Command has a Police Liaison Officer who maintains contact and liaison with residential units where 'Looked after Children' are cared for in the area. This role has resulted in positive working relations between Police and residential unit staff. When required, the Police Liaison Officer works in conjunction with the Missing Person Co-ordinator who similarly enjoys a positive working relationship with residential units. Highland CHAMPS - The Highland CHAMPS (Children have Amazing Minds, Potential and Stories) are a group based in Clachnaharry, Inverness, Highland. Highland CHAMPS welcome any young person from the Highland area who identifies as care-experienced whether they are a care-leaver, looked after at home, fostered, adopted, in residential care or other. Highland CHAMPS provide a safe space for activities, opportunities, socialising and fun.
