Report Title: Performance against Gaelic Language Plan 3 (GLP3)

Report By: Executive Chief Officer – Performance and Governance

1. Purpose/Executive Summary

- 1.1 This report is to inform Members of the progress in delivering the Gaelic Language Plan 3 (GLP3) and how it is monitored.
- 1.2 The Highland Council uses a Performance and Risk Management System (PRMS) for monitoring corporate plans. GLP3 has been adopted as part of the corporate plan and is therefore incorporated into PRMS which facilitates streamlined and focussed reporting.
- 1.3 PRMS data is shown in **Appendix 1**
- 1.4 A refreshed GLP (2023 – 2028) was submitted to Bòrd na Gàidhlig on June 6th and the Highland Council are awaiting a response to the submission.

3. Implications

- 3.1 Resource
The delivery of the GLP is funded by The Highland Council, Scottish Government grants and various Bòrd na Gàidhlig (BnaG) funding streams.

The Highland Council's Statutory Gaelic Plan Grants budget is also used to provide financial support to key external organisations which assist to deliver services and key enabling actions with the GLP3.

- 3.2 Legal
The Highland Council is required to have an approved Gaelic Language Plan in

Terms of the Gaelic Language (Scotland) Act 2005. There are consequential obligations in ensuring that the GLP commitments are implemented.

3.3 Community (Equality, Poverty, Rural and Island)

The implementation of GLP has a strong community focus across the Highlands.

3.4 Climate Change / Carbon Clever

The Gaelic Team continue to maximise the use of technologies in relation to meetings, travel, online tuition, and other online Gaelic cultural events.

3.5 Risk

There are no significant risks.

3.6 Health and Safety (risks arising from changes to plant, equipment, process, or people)

There are no risks.

3.7 Gaelic

Very positive implications regarding the preservation and development of Gaelic language and culture across corporate, education, and community sectors. This also enhances the social and economic value of Gaelic and its associated culture.

4. Gaelic Language Plan

4.1 The current GLP has the following themes which are aligned to Bòrd na Gàidhlig's high level aims:

- Gaelic in the Home, Early Learning and Child Care
- Gaelic in the Community
- Gaelic in Education
- Gaelic in the Arts, Culture, and Heritage
- Gaelic in the Workplace
- The Social, Economic and Cultural Value of Gaelic

4.2 **Appendix 1** summarises the current position regarding the progress being made in implementing GLP3.

There are 126 enabling actions in GLP3 which span the 6 themes. Most of the actions are subject to and supported by the following:

- available resources
- Scottish Government
- support from BnaG
- positive key stakeholder engagement and partnership working
- engagement and collaboration with schools and community groups

A summary of the indicators from Quarter 2 2022/23 to Quarter 1 2023/24 is illustrated in the table below.

5 Key Performance Indicators (KPIs)

- 5.1 The Gaelic Team are currently progressing a series of Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) for use during the monitoring of the refreshed Gaelic Language Plan 2023–28 (GLP).
- 5.2 Whilst quantitative KPIs can be used to report numerical values for much of the monitoring of the GLP, there are elements of the work that is delivered which produces non-numerical or qualitative data.

The updated KPIs will enable the monitoring of qualitative data in a measurable way. It will also enhance the PRMS reporting system and allow progress towards an objective to be monitored more clearly, detect patterns over time and will assist in setting goals and adapting accordingly.

6. Short Case Study Gaelic Medium Secondary Pupils' Visit to Donegal, Ireland

- 6.1 In June, the Gaelic Team (Community Learning and Development) organised a cultural residential visit to Donegal. This included 23 Gaelic speaking secondary pupils from schools across the Highland Council area who took part in the 4-day residential visit.

This project delivers within 'The Social, Economic and Cultural Value of Gaelic' theme and enabling action to 'Continue to develop links with the broader linguistic and cultural diaspora, for example Nova Scotia and other countries with lesser-used languages such as Ireland and Wales.'

The pupils were accompanied by 3 staff members. Young people from Inverness Royal Academy, Glen Urquhart High School and Tain Royal Academy participated. The young people stayed at the Breesy Centre, Ballyshannon and participated in both outdoor and cultural activities from surfing and Gaelic football to Irish dancing.

The pupils had an opportunity to meet young people from the local area who tutored them in football and Irish dancing. They also had the opportunity to converse and talk about differences and similarities between their own communities, language, and areas in the Highlands and the Donegal regions.

The following are several testimonies received from parents and pupils.

" My grandmother came from Ireland, and this makes her stories more real"

" It was the best trip ever"

" It was so interesting to see the differences in person and also how much there is in common. It's the same but different."

Parental anecdotes - one parent commented on how enriching an experience the trip had been for her son and how it had helped to forge and cement friendships with his peer group.

Another parent commented on how the "extra-curricular" activities and Ireland trips allowed her children to take part in activities they would not have been able to access, those experiences were lasting, positive memories of Gaelic medium education.

Previous participants – This year, a former participant in the project in previous years, requested to take part as a staff member. She is currently studying Gaelic and Education in Sabhal Mor Ostaig and hopes to qualify as Gaelic Medium Teacher.

Former participants are important to the project as mentors on each trip. Pupils positively identify with mentors and this assists the young people to associate Gaelic with a younger age-group. This also shows Gaelic is relevant and important out-with the school and classroom environment.

Images from the visit can be viewed in the Gaelic Committee's Good News items, which will be presented at the Committee. The visit was part funded by Highland Council's Scottish Government Gaelic Specific Grant and Bòrd na Gàidhlig's Colm Cille funding stream.
