4 Background

- 4.1 The Scottish Housing Regulator (SHR) has set out the performance indicators that it will use in its scrutiny of landlords.
- 4.2 This report provides key performance information based on the reporting framework recommended by the SHR.
- 4.3 Further performance information by Council Ward can be found on the Highland Council Intranet ward reporting pages.

- 4.4 In accordance with the Scottish Social Housing Charter guidance, the Repairs, Tenancy Management and Rent Arrears figures are cumulative, while the Homeless Presentations figures are given for each separate quarter.
- 4.5 Scottish Housing Network (SHN) benchmark information, derived from the performance of all Scottish Landlords, has also been provided where available.

5 Repairs

- 5.1 The key indicators for measuring repairs performance are considered to be the average time taken to complete Emergency repairs and Non-emergency repairs.
- 5.2 The average length of time taken to complete Emergency repairs is calculated in hours.

5.4 The average response time for emergency repairs for both Sutherland wards is within the 12 hour target. Emergency repairs remain a priority for this service.

5.7 In gathering the information for repairs indicators, we do not include instances where we have been unable to gain access to properties. This is in accordance with the Scottish Social Housing Charter guidance.

6 Tenancy Management

6.1 The chart below provides information on the average re-let time showing the trend in Q4 22/23 for comparison.

6.3 The average relet time for Wards 1 & 4, is higher than the target of 35 days. Performance in North, West & Central Sutherland has been negatively impacted in low demand areas where it has taken longer than usual to identify a new tenant.

7 Rent Arrears

7.1 A key indicator for rent arrears is considered to be the value of current rent arrears. The table below shows the comparative figure for the last 5 Quarters.

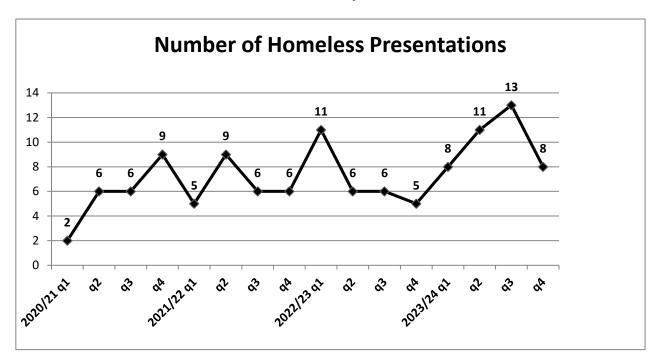

- 7.2 Rent arrears have increased in North, West & Central Sutherland and have decreased in East Sutherland & Edderton in Quarter 4.
- 7.3 The Cost of Living (Scotland) Act ended on 31 March 2024. This means that landlords can progress to eviction for cases with arrears below £2,250.
- 7.4 The local housing team continue to focus on early intervention, with robust reviewing arrangements in place for all arrears cases. Officers are committed to supporting all tenants currently facing financial hardship and continue to offer advice and assistance and signposting to specialist services.

8 Homelessness

- 8.1 Performance information on homelessness is not collected as part of the Scottish Social Housing Charter return, however a number of indicators have been agreed for reporting to Local Committees.
- 8.2 Table 5 shows the number of homeless presentations received.
- 8.3 There were 386 presentations across Highland at the end of Q4 2023/24, 8 of these presentations were in Sutherland.
