4 Background

- 4.1 The Scottish Housing Regulator (SHR) has set out the performance indicators that it will use in its scrutiny of landlords.
- 4.2 This report provides key performance information based on the reporting framework recommended by the Scottish Housing Regulator.
- 4.3 Further performance information by Council Ward can be found on the Highland Council Intranet ward reporting pages:- http://www.highland.gov.uk/staffsite/info/13/members_intranet/37/ward_reporting/2
- 4.4 In accordance with the Scottish Social Housing Charter guidance, the Repairs, Tenancy Management and Rent Arrears figures are cumulative, while the Homeless Presentations figures are given for each separate quarter.
- 4.5 Scottish Housing Network (SHN) benchmark information, derived from the performance of all Scottish Landlords, has also been provided where available.

5 Repairs

- 5.1 The key indicators for measuring repairs performance are considered to be the average time taken to complete Emergency repairs and Non-emergency repairs.
- 5.2 The average length of time taken to complete Emergency repairs is calculated in hours.

5.3 Table 1: Average length of time taken to complete emergency repairs (hours) Target 12 hours 2022/23 SHN Benchmark (Group) – 4.2 hours

- 5.4 The average time reported for Emergency repairs is 10.9 hours which is within the 12 hour target.
- 5.5 Non-emergency repairs are measured in working days.

- 5.7 The average response time for non-emergency repairs is within the 8.9 day target and better than the Highland average.
- 5.8 In gathering the information for repairs indicators, we do not include instances where we have been unable to gain access to properties. This is in accordance with the Scottish Social Housing Charter guidance.

6 Tenancy Management

6.1 The chart at table 3 provides information on the average re-let time for all void properties, highlighting the same quarter in the previous year for comparison, these figures are reported to the Scottish Housing Regulator.

6.3 Re-let performance in Badenoch and Strathspey is 15.82 days and remains well within the 35 day target.

7 Rent Arrears

7.1 A key indicator for rent arrears is considered to be the value of current rent arrears. The table below shows the comparative figure for the same quarter in the previous year.

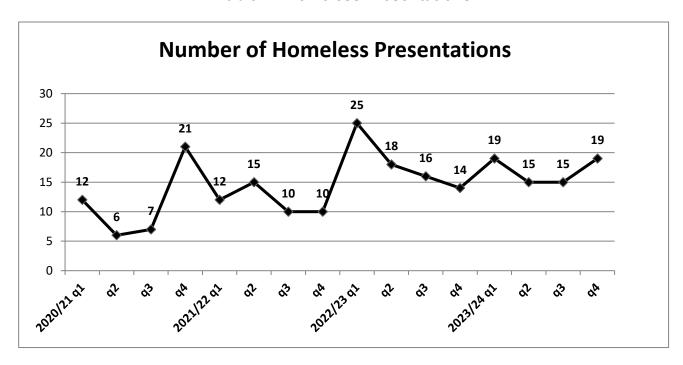

- 7.3 Rent arrears have increased across Badenoch & Strathspey in Quarter 4 2023/24. The increase reflects the current economical situation and subsequent financial difficulty for some tenants.
- 7.4 The Service continues to have a focus on contacting tenants to offer advice and assistance and signposting to specialist services. The local Badenoch and Strathspey team are committed to early intervention to prevent further escalation of arrears and are proactive in contacting tenants early in the arrears process, agreeing re-payment plans with tenants and maintaining contact.

8 Homelessness

- 8.1 Performance information on homelessness is not collected as part of the Scottish Social Housing Charter return, however a number of indicators have been agreed for reporting to Local Committees.
- 8.2 Table 7 shows the number of homeless presentations received.
- 8.3 There were 386 presentations across Highland at the end of Quarter 4, 2023. There were 19 presentations in Badenoch and Strathspey.
