Report Title: Transitionary report: Progress against Gaelic Language Plan

1. Purpose/Executive Summary

- 1.1 This report is to inform Members of the progress in delivering the Gaelic Language Plan 2024–29 (GLP) and the work underway to transition between the current and previous iterations of the GLP.
- 1.2 The Highland Council uses a Performance and Risk Management System (PRMS) for monitoring corporate plans. The latest iteration of the GLP was approved on 7 May 2024 and work has been ongoing to enter the GLP into PRMS.
- 1.3 PRMS data is presented in a booklet format and can be viewed in **Appendix 1**.
- 1.4 A short instructional video will be played during the committee meeting to demonstrate how to access and navigate PRMS to view the indicators of progress against the GLP outcomes.
- 1.5 A short summary of the latest census data relating to Gaelic will be provided.

2. Recommendations

- 2.1 Members are asked to:
 - i. Discuss, and note the report
 - ii. Note that the next PRMS report available will also be a transitionary report between the current GLP and the refreshed GLP.

3. Implications

3.1 Resource

The delivery of the GLP is funded by The Highland Council, Scottish Government grants and various Bòrd na Gàidhlig (BnaG) funding streams.

3.2 Legal

The Highland Council has a statutory duty to have a Gaelic Language Plan in terms of Gaelic Language (Scotland) Act 2005. The statutory duty includes the obligation to implement and accurately report GLP commitments.

3.3 Community (Equality, Poverty, Rural and Island)
The outcomes of the GLP have a strong community focus across the Highlands.

3.4 Climate Change / Carbon Clever

The Gaelic Team continue to maximise the use of technologies in relation to meetings, travel, online tuition, and other online Gaelic events.

3.5 Risk

Outcomes with the GLP are not achieved. Negative impacts upon Gaelic language and culture.

3.6 Gaelic

Very positive implications regarding the preservation and development of Gaelic language and culture across corporate, education and community sectors. This also enhances the social and economic value of Gaelic and its associated culture.

4. Transitioning to GLP 2024–29

- 4.1 The Highland Council GLP 2024–29 was approved on 7 May 2024. The implementation of the refreshed GLP has involved transferring the outcomes from the plan into PRMS. This transfer is now complete and GLP outcomes can now be reported against. A full monitoring report will be available for the next meeting of the Gaelic Committee.
- 4.2 There are 91 enabling actions in the Highland Council's fourth iteration of its GLP, which span four themes:
 - Communities and Home
 - · Media, Arts, Culture and Heritage
 - Business and the Economy
 - Education
- 4.3 There are 38 actions relating to the Corporate Service Aims outlined within the GLP. The Corporate Service Aims will be utilised with the aim of standardising and normalising key Gaelic services across all Council services during the lifetime of the Plan All public authorities preparing Gaelic language plans are required to include these within each edition of their plan with the understanding that these will be achieved through incremental growth.
- 4.4 Most of the actions are subject to, and supported by, the following:
 - available resources
 - Scottish Government

- support from Bòrd na Gàidhlig
- positive key stakeholder engagement and partnership working
- engagement and collaboration with schools and community groups
- 4.5 The enabling actions within the latest edition of the Highland Council Gaelic Language Plan focus on growth and enhancing our provision of Gaelic Services. However, much of the Gaelic work the Highland Council engages in is ongoing and embedded practice. This includes ongoing work to achieve our Corporate Service aims in relation to Gaelic. Many of the desired outcomes within the Corporate Service aims are already being fulfilled by adhering to the policy guidelines on the use of Gaelic in Highland Council services.

Furthermore, we also continue to work with a range of Gaelic organisations to deliver extra-curricular activities in sport, drama, music and the arts. Therefore, initiatives which are deemed to be current practice will also be reported on within PRMS.

- 4.6 As of 1 July 2024, the Highland Council implemented a new approach to carrying out Integrated Impact Assessments (IIA) which includes a stage 1 Screening process and a stage 2 Full Impact Assessment. We undertake impact assessments to ensure that we:
 - understand the impact of our business proposals, policies or decisions on different groups and communities
 - use our understanding of impacts to develop better policies and practices
 - help prevent or mitigate against potential negative impacts and reduce disadvantage
 - are more transparent and accountable by demonstrating that likely impacts of proposals have been considered as well as any mitigating action to overcome negative impacts

Any new or revised policy, practice or strategic decision relating to the delivery of Council services are considered for impacts at an early stage. The outcomes, including planned projects, within the refreshed GLP will be screened and assessed in accordance with the IIA process.

5. PRMS outputs

- 5.1 The full PRMS data can be accessed in **Appendix 1.** The booklet format used is a newly-implemented approach for presenting the data for it to be more accessible and easier to interpret.
- 5.2 A short instructional video will be played that demonstrates how to access and navigate PRMS to view the indicators of progress against the GLP outcomes.

6. Overview of the work of the Gaelic Team

- 6.1 The GLP is multidisciplinary and spans multiple fields and industries, including sport, culture, music, education and the economy.
- 6.2 The range of work undertaken by the Gaelic Team to implement the GLP is displayed in a one-page synopsis in **Appendix 2**.

7. Census data

7.1 Census data relating to Gaelic was published on 21 May 2024. The results of the census will be used to inform programmes of work outlined within the GLP and to ensure that key demographics are targeted with greater accuracy.

The census found that, on a national level, 2.5% of people aged 3 and over had some skills in Gaelic in 2022. This is an increase of 43,100 people since 2011 when 1.7% had some skills in Gaelic. In the Highland region this figure increased from 7.4% to 8.1%.



Partnership working ensures we collaborate to support the main aims of the National GLP of increasing the use and learning of Gaelic.

Gaelic cultural events, such as Na Trads, are also significant economic generators in the Highland region.

Gaelic in the workplace

The GLP 2024-29 contains Corporate Service Aims with 37 discrete outcomes with the aim of standardising key Gaelic services across the public sector.

The Gaelic Team also support other corporate functions through the provision of a translation service and management of the Gaelic committee.
